

MA IN COMMUNITY HEALTH PROMOTION

Prepare yourself to meet the expanding need for health education professionals capable of working with the community in a variety of public, private and professional settings. Add health education and promotion knowledge, skills and competencies to healthcare, public or community health, social work, and other careers by completing the advanced certificate program.

MAIN HEALTH EDUCATION

Prepare to teach health education in pre–K to grade 12 to children with various learning styles and help them make healthy choices. We offer three degree programs: MA (professional) for those who hold a valid New York state initial/provisional teacher certification in health education; MA (in-service) for those who have initial teacher certification in an area other than health education; and MA (pre-service or Graduate Alternative Teacher Education-GATE) for students without prior teacher certification.

The Certificate of Advanced Graduate Study (CAGS) pathway for health education is available for students who already have a master's degree and teacher certification, but who want to add health as another area of certification without getting another master's degree.

MA IN PHYSICAL ACTIVITY STUDIES

Enhance your knowledge base and leadership skills as a physical activity professional in schools, sports, government and nongovernment settings and specialize in Sport-Based Youth Development, School District Leadership in Administration in Physical Education, Health and Athletics, or Teaching Adapted Physical Education.

MA IN PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Prepare yourself to teach physical education in schools by earning a master's degree that offers three degrees: for those without initial teacher certification (preservice), for students who are certified in other areas (in-service), and for a professional certification with a specialization in Teaching Adapted Physical Education.

MS IN EXERCISE SCIENCE

Work with high-level and recreational athletes as well as people diagnosed with cardiovascular, neurological, orthopedic and other health problems. Our students engage with the latest exercise testing technology in Adelphi's state-of-the-art Human Performance Laboratory. They develop exercise training prescriptions and work with clients in our on-site adult fitness center, gaining invaluable experience.
